AN EDITORIAL

Since June is the month for Confirmation and Commissioning, I'd like to review a point that came up not too long ago at the school where I teach. One of my students said that he was making his confirmation this month. I asked him why he was being confirmed; he replied that he was now fourteen and it was time to be confirmed. My thoughts immediately went back to my days with our Warren Point Confirmation-Commissioning classes, when near the end of the semester, I would ask the members of each class, "Why are you being confirmed?"

I would receive all sorts of answers: "I'm fifteen years old," or, "This is the last year of Sunday School, and it's time to be confirmed," or, "My parents said I have to be confirmed," or any other number of answers except the one I had hoped (and still hope) to hear; I never heard anyone say, "Because I want to be Confirmed."

It's certainly reassuring to hear that young people are willing to do things they are expected to do, even if they some of those things just to please other people; but I've always figured that being confirmed is something very different from, say washing dishes or mowing the lawn or visiting a sick relative, because there is a commitment involved. It would be as if someone gets married simply because his family expects him to. I would like to think that someone is confirmed for the same reason that someone is married; in marriage, he has found the person he has found the person he can commit himself to for life; in confirmation, he has found faith and the pathway to God that he can follow and commit himself to for life.

A MESSAGE FROM THE PASTOR

With a great deal of emotion, as I was trying to come up with some way to characterize the flurry of special Sundays in the life of our congregation coming in June, did "June Is Bustin' Out All Over" from Rogers and Hammerstein's masterpiece *Carousel* rush to center-stage.

On Sunday, June 7, two of our young people, Kristen Little and Matthew Smits, will Reaffirm the Baptismal Covenant (be Confirmed) into which they were baptized early in the year 2000. We will celebrate the Sacrament of the Lord's Supper. In Fellowship Hall following Morning Worship the Church School will be providing ice cream cake, traditionally enjoyed after the Children's Day worship service...but not this year.

On that Sunday, June 14, we will be celebrating our congregation's 90th Anniversary <u>and</u> Children's Day. (The Session moved the Anniversary Sunday commemoration from the third Sunday in June to the second Sunday because of its proximity to the actual calendar date of our church's founding, June 15, 1925.) Thus our Morning Worship will have a dual focus, but the Fellowship Hour hosted by the Session will have only one feature, a delicious cake. It is understood that the 90th Anniversary Sunday will be the "kick-off" to celebrating 90 years of ministry and mission. **Please remember that worship on that day begins at 9:30 am.**

On Sunday, June 21, during the 9:30 am Morning Worship service we will celebrate the Sacrament of Baptism. Reese Katherine O'Brien, my second granddaughter, will be baptized. Again there will be a Fellowship Hour following the service. And don't forget to thank Mrs. Kim and the choir on that day for their musical leadership, as this is the final Sunday until the Fall that the choir will share in worship leadership.

As almost all of you know, and about which you can read in my article on page 10 in this edition of your favorite newsletter, much time and attention have been devoted to recovering from the break-in that occurred in our church building late on Good Friday evening, diverting energy and resources from our New Beginnings emphasis, which, unlike June, has yet to "bust out all over."

Nevertheless we are reaching out to the communities that surround us with the blood drive on June 26, as advertised on page 2, the first of much more to come. Please be a part of that. Our Lord Jesus Christ teaches that we should love our neighbor as we love ourselves.

I look forward to worshiping with you on these Sundays, sharing our congregation's joy!

Spiritual Reflections

About That Word

I have a confession to make. I enjoy reading children's and adolescent literature even though my children are fully grown and I have no grandchildren to whom I can read stories. Recently I have been reading a trio of novels by a woman named Cornelia Funke entitled *Inkheart, Inkspell* and *Inkdeath. Inkheart,* at least three of the characters suddenly materialize in his living room. At the same time his dear wife, Resa, along with their cat and possibly other creatures disappear, presumably to take their place in the novel. The rest of the books explore how Mo and his daughter manage to rescue Resa only to become intricately involved in the world of that story.

Two things come to my mind as I concern myself with this story. The first is the notion that someone can read a story out loud with such skills that the listeners become aware of nothing but the story itself, as if they had been transported into another world. We know that there are such people as there are writers, as well, whose skill is such that we can "lose ourselves" in their books. (Insert your favorite author's name here). As a preacher I can only dream of this power and imagine how wonderful it would be to have the members of the congregation hanging over every word I spoke. And what a remarkable revival would be seen in the church if the stories of our faith could be as alive as if the characters stood right before us and we felt the power of the Holy spirit surging through them and us. I, personally, have always striven to preach in such a way as to help my listeners understand more fully the passages of scripture used for that day. Of course this is exactly what I was taught to do by my seminary professors, as are most preachers and ministers of the Word that I know. Yet there is so much competition in our society for attention and persuasion has become a fine art honed by the media and advertisers and politicians and so on, that sometimes our message gets lost and people are not as convinced by mere words as they once were.

This brings me to the second thing I thought about in reaction to the story (continued on p. 8)

But that gospel, that good news, that Word is the light of humanity, was not without opposition. As Paul tells us, the gospel message of Christ crucified is a stumbling block to the Jews and folly to the Greeks. We know that Jewish faith has largely rejected the Christian claim of Jesus on the ground that no human deserves to be likened to God, which is exactly what John does. In a like manner the Greco-Roman world could accept that the gods would take human form from time to time, even in the guise of the Emperor, but certainly not in the form of an executed Jewish criminal named Jesus.

Nonetheless we Christians assert that the Word of God, the very will of God for human life was not merely written in Jewish Law or spoken by the great prophets, but came to life in the son of a carpenter from Nazareth. His refusal to play the power game of this world, to put his own interest first or to let the end justify the means, speaks God's will. That fact that all of his acts were directed to supporting the weak, the helpless, and abandoned individuals of society by assuring them of God's love, speaks God's will. His command to love our neighbors as much as we love ourselves, to treat others in the way we would want to be treated, speaks God's will. And most importantly his complete devotion and surrender to God's sovereignty, even came alive in Jesus is a way more powerful than any written or spoken form could. And he gave us the way to bring it alive as well by imitating him in selfless acts of love, mercy and justice, humbly submitted to God and supported by God's Holy Spirit.

THE BREAK-IN AND THE NEW REALITY

On the evening of April 3, during our joint Good Friday worship service at Van Riper-Ellis Broadway Baptist Church, I offered a prayer of invocation in which I included the observation that on this holy night life was going on all around us with little attention paid to its significance. Little did I know how true my observation was.

Early the next morning, the day before Easter, I came into the dark hallway that leads to the Church Office and saw a shaft of light coming through that office door. It was then that I realized that our church had been broken into. I immediately exited and called the police.

The security cameras, installed after the last break-in, showed a single perpetrator who shattered the glass window in the door and also kicked in the Pastor's Study door, from the two offices taking keys, money, and my laptop computer, not to mention leaving debris behind.

Inspection of the church building revealed that the criminal broke one of the Fellowship Hall windows behind the tall bushes on the 17th Street side, likely after the A.A. folks had concluded their meeting.

The recovery period has come to a close, almost. The Fellowship Hall window has been replaced. There is a new key for the Sanctuary and Chancel doors. The Church Office has a new door and a new lock. The Pastor's Study has a new door and new locks. The door trims have been replaced or repaired and the hallway repainted.

And then there is the new reality. A security alarm system has been installed. When the alarm system is on, you cannot enter the hallway leading to the Church Office and the Pastor's Study unless you know the password. Please read the following carefully:

When the alarm system is on,

- you cannot open the green door in the stairwell leading to the hallway
- you cannot open the Chancel door by where the pastor and choir sit
 - you cannot open the Sanctuary door leading to the hallway

without setting off the alarm.

And, be aware, when the alarm system is off and you open those doors and/or enter the hallway, there is a three-note chime. *Don't be alarmed* when you hear it!
